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A biodiversity hotspot

This year is the International Year of Biodiversity so we will be putting a special focus on biodiversity during our excursions this year. Western Australia's south-west is one of 34 locations worldwide that have been identified as biodiversity hotspots by Conservation International. These are places which contain particularly high levels of biodiversity under threat. We are lucky to live in such a vibrant ecosystem but it also comes with responsibilities. So far, 11 species of mammals have become extinct in WA since European settlement and 37 are threatened, all due to human impact of one kind or another.

So why do we have such a unique range of flora and fauna and why is it so vulnerable? Researchers have found that in general as biomass (the total amount of living things) increases, biodiversity (the range of different living things) decreases. Because our climate is quite arid and our soils low in nutrients, it is difficult for any single species to

flourish and dominate, so many species have developed to take advantage of environmental niches. The forest is a system in balance which has evolved in isolation. Introduction of diseases and species such as invasive weeds and predators, without their natural controls, and European practices of land management, which are suited to different soils and climates than our own, can very quickly put our fragile ecosystem out of balance. What can we do about it? DEC has many programs that address threats to biodiversity. We at EcoEducation believe that the first step to protecting our amazing environment starts with raising awareness in children of all ages and giving them the wonder and understanding to value and protect our natural heritage. New programs 2010

Caring for Places

A new program for 2010 in the South West Region is *Caring for Places.* This excursion is suitable for students from Years 6 to 10 and looks at the importance of our national parks to the preservation of biodiversity. Students explore the values, threats and impact of people on our national parks. They meet a park ranger and learn about the job they do and the challenges of managing national parks. As active citizens they also have a chance to become involved in regeneration of a degraded part of the park.

Sustainable Forestry

Timber is a valuable and renewable resource and makes an excellent study topic for students doing the new Geography 2A, the geography of sustainable resource use. EcoEducation South West will be offering a new excursion, *Sustainable Forestry*, from the middle of Term 3 which is tailored to the curriculum outcomes of this unit. Students will various aspects of forest management for timber production and learn the importance of integrating this with management for a range of other forest values.
