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now be accessed this way, meaning course participants won't need to sit on uncomfortable chairs for quite as long as they used to!

We think the eLearning is fun, colourful and very easy to follow, while still delivering high quality sections of training. Feedback so far has been very positive.

We are also moving towards becoming a paperless unit, this includes communications as well as information.

Handbooks for Campground Hosts and the basic rehabilitation course are now produced on USB thumb drives - much lighter than a 250 page manual to carry around as well as better for the environment, while still offering the same high level of content.

Please don't forget to get your timesheets into us as soon as possible after the end of the next quarter on March 31.

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Those of you that returned timesheets for the second quarter and have accumulated enough hours should have received your rewards recently.

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DEC Volunteer of the Year Awards

The 30th November 2012 saw DEC host the annual Volunteer of the Year and Outstanding Service awards at the WA Conservation Science Centre at Kensington.

The annual event celebrates the work of people who volunteer on environmental projects and programs with DEC.

Around 80 volunteers and DEC staff attended the awards, which were introduced by DEC Director General Keiran McNamara and Deputy Director General Parks and Conservation Jim Sharp, and presented by Hon Bill Marmion Minister for Environment; Water.

In his speech, Mr Marmion paid tribute to the important contribution volunteers make to protecting Western Australia's environment.

Mr Marmion said the tasks undertaken by DEC volunteers were varied and often demanding, but ultimately rewarding.

Kanyana Wildlife Discovery Centre launch

Kanyana's Wildlife Discovery Centre was launched to great acclaim by the Hon Bill Marmion (Minister for Environment; Water) on Wednesday 31st October 2012

The official opening was attended by a number of VIPs including Perth Hills resident, the Hon John Day MLA.

The occasion was marked by Minister Marmion walking across the threshold of the Discovery Centre with Henry, Kanyana's red-tailed black cockatoo, on his shoulder.

There was some uncertainty as to whether Minister Marmion would agree to this act due to the possibility of Henry leaving a little present on his shoulder.

Minister Marmion thankfully rose to the challenge and we are pleased to report that Minister Marmion emerged unscathed, from the proceedings!

Approximately 100 guests joined in the celebration of the long awaited Discovery Centre opening and were the first to view this unique facility during a 30 minute guided tour.

Guests had the highest of praise for Consultants, BKay Design, who built the Centre with support

from many Kanyana volunteers.

All who attended were impressed by the array of interactive displays, fascinating facts, beautiful photography and unique video footage.



The Discovery Centre is the realisation of a long held goal by founder, June Butcher, which was finally made possible thanks to the generosity of Chevron Australia, the major sponsor, and Fortescue Metals Group (FMG) who funded the upgrade of the Reptile Room.

Russell Lagdon, Chevron's Environment Manager, attended the opening and paid tribute to Kanyana's work in caring for native fauna and raising awareness of the value of WA's wildlife.

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Bush Rangers Tree Planting by Emmanuel Catholic College Years 8 & 9

The Emmanuel Catholic College Bush Rangers have been planting seedlings within the Beeliar Regional Park for several years with thousands so far planted.

However, in 2010 they began planting seedlings at a particular site, directly adjacent to the school's football oval.

This region of Beeliar Regional Park was put forward as one of the original sites for the Fiona Stanley Hospital and was cleared accordingly.

However the hospital was relocated to its current location which was most fortunate, as building a large public hospital would no doubt have caused considerable environmental impact to this region.

Consequently, as part of the Healthy Parks, Healthy People initiative and in collaboration with local DEC and local government agencies, the Emmanuel Bush Rangers have been actively revegetating the site that was previously left considerably barren and devastated.

They began planting several endemic species in



the area in 2010.

Many of the *Banksia* and *Casaurina* spp have unfortunately not survived, but most of the *Eucalyptus* seedlings planted have thrived.

It is incredible to see the huge growth of trees from year to year.

Also, what is even more exciting is the wildlife that is starting to reclaim the area, with many bird species increasing, as well as frogs.

This in itself is reassuring as frogs are great indicators of the health of an ecosystem.

When sampling the water from the Kogolup Lake, it is surprisingly quite clean and pH neutral, and the salt content is reducing, which is fantastic!

The Bush Rangers at Emmanuel have also been constructing bird boxes this year which they hope to place on the larger trees on the edge of the football oval that borders the site, as well as more within the Beeliar Regional Park.

Hopefully these will attract more native bird species back to the area, particularly Carnaby's Cockatoos, which have became quite scarce with the local urbanisation.

Bush Rangers will continue planting in this area until the whole area is rehabilitated back to its former glory.



The Western Australian Museum has two useful Apps available for iPhone. iPods and iPads.

The first is 'Dangerous Land Snakes of Western Australia' (pictured).


It's always good to know about snakes that inhabit your area, and how to recognise them.

There are 54 species of venomous land snakes known to inhabit WA.

Of these, the majority are venomous but considered too small to be harmful to humans.

However, there are still 14 snakes that are considered to be dangerously venomous and capable of inflicting a bite that require antivenom treatment.

This App helps you to identify these snakes and also contains First Aid information.



Have you ever wondered what skinks can be found in your garden or local area? Have you spotted a skink or small lizard and want to identify it?

Skinks of the Perth Region gives you all the details about our scaled friends, including images, maps, descriptions habitat. and general observations for 29 species of skinks that can be

located around the Perth region.

Everything you wanted to know about the family Scincidae in the Perth area is now available in one convenient app.

Whether it's a curious mind, or the desire for a quick identification, this app is a must for any lizard lover visiting or living near Perth.

Transport Coordinator Volunteers needed for Munda Biddi Epic 1000

Role Overview:

There are two positions at any one time. The two positions would be ideal if two friends wanted to join together however individuals are also welcome to volunteer (they will be paired with another volunteer).

- Volunteers will be required to bring their own tent and sleeping gear and will need to stay in camps with riders when not in towns. They can also stay with the group in caravan parks when in towns at no cost. (Otherwise you can opt to stay in other accommodation at your own expense when in towns).
- Two Transport Coordinators are needed throughout the ride. If there are two people who are willing to join the event for the entire ride (i.e. three weeks) then that is suitable however, it is envisaged more likely that three different groups of two people would rotate weekly.

Ride Description:

The Munda Biddi Epic 1000 is the first ever end-to-end ride on the completed 1000km long Munda Biddi Trail from Albany to Perth between 7th April to 28th April 2013. The focus of the event celebrating completion of the trail and as such the Epic event will pass through a number of communities which will join in the celebrations in each town. When in town, the Ride will stay at caravan parks. When not in town (roughly one third of the time) the Ride will stay in Munda Biddi huts.

The Ride is a supported event so riders' sleeping gear needs moving between campsites. The Ride is guided by two Ride Leaders and will be supported by the two volunteer Transport Coordinators and two cooks.

Role Objectives:

- 1. Drive a 4WD, pulling a trailer between campsites,
- 2. Transport riders' gear, spares, water, first aid etc between campsites each day,
- 3. Pick up riders en-route in non-emergency situations and take them and/or their bikes to camp or to towns where required,
- 4. Help set up cooking and campsite where requested by cook,
- 5. Liaise with Ride Leaders and cook to pick up supplies where needed,
- 6. Be part of the group completing the first ever end-to-end on the longest continuous off-road cycle trail in the world and join in celebrations in the communities.

Skills Required:

- Off-road 4WD experience including pulling trailers,
- Open-minded and willingness to help out where required,
- A sense of fun,
- Interest in sharing the experience of a lifetime.

What is provided:

- Three meals a day except evening meals when in some towns (some meals provided at community events),
- Campsites,
- 4WD troop carriers and trailers,
- Funds for petrol and other supplies required to fulfill the role.

What Volunteers will need to provide:

- Sleeping gear (tent, sleeping bag, mattress, pillow), clothes and personal needs in a 20kg bag,
- Some meals when in some towns.

Dates required:

Week 1: 7th April – 14th April.

Week 2: 14th April- 22 April

Week 3: 22 April- 28th April
