

INFORMATION FROM RESEARCH DIVISION POLICY GROUP MEETING HELD 1 MARCH 1988 AT DWELLINGUP RESEARCH CENTRE.

* HERBARIUM

Last issue it was reported that the Herbarium would be joining CALM mid February. Unfortunately the transfer cannot be finalized until the various Acts of Parliament that the Herbarium works under are altered. The Herbarium Transfer Group continues to meet and is addressing such issues as structure, funding etc. A workshop was also held with CALM and Herbarium staff late last month.

* CALM ACT TECHNICAL STAFF

CALM Act Technical Staff have reached a concensus on conditions for transfer into the Public Service. These conditions will be compared with Public Service Act awards, discussed and presented to the Human Resources Branch.

* INTERSTATE AND OVERSEAS TRAVEL POLICY

The current draft Departmental policy does not make allowances for technical staff to travel interstate nor does it makes provision for more than one officer to attend the same conference. The RDPG will review these polices and submit a revised provedure to Policy Directorate for approval.

* PERFORMANCE APPRAISAL

John Bartle has finalized a performance appraisal form for the Research Division. This will be used on a trial basis and also until such times as the review on Departmental Performance Appraisal forms is completed. Research Division will not have a unique appraisal system as we will comply to some degree with the Departmental system. However there will be room to adopt the forms to fit our special requirements.

* FLORA CONSERVATION RESEARCH PROGRAM LEADER

With the appointment of Steve Hopper to the SPRS position and a permanent member of RDPG the issue of Flora Conservation Program Leader was addressed. At this stage the selection of a new Program Leader will be deferred until after the Program Reviews and also until such time as the Herbarium is incorporated into the Division.

* MEETING WITH DWELLINGUP RESEARCH CENTRE STAFF

Whilst in Dwellingup RDPG members met with the Dwellingup Research Centre staff. Concerns with building conditions and the transfer of CALM Act technical staff were discussed. These informal discussions were followed by an update on Research Projects

Richard Mazanec and Ashley Kennett-Smith spoke on their work in relation to Jarrah Forest Rehabilitation. Progress with the Plant Diseases and Pests Program was addressed by Bryan Shearer. This was followed by Geoff Stoneman speaking on silviculture and hydrology and Kim Whitford on ways of measuring leaf area index.

The transfer of information proved rewarding to both the visitors and the residents.

* DEVELOPMENT OF POLICY FOR DECLARED RARE FAUNA

A working group has recently been formed to prepare a draft Departmental Policy on Declared Rare Fauna. The group aims to:

(1) Develop a draft policy on declared rare fauna

(2) Revise the current list of species

(3) Consider licensing in relation to declared rare fauna.


The working group is chaired by Andrew Burbidge. Other members of the group are Bob Prince (Woodvale) Allan Burbidge(Woodvale), John Blyth (Scientific Advisor, Crawley) and Dr Paddy Berry (Museum).

* CONFERENCES AND SEMINARS

Angas Hopkins has recently been invited to present a paper at the CSIRO International Geosphere - Biosphere Program Workshop in Canberra on the effects of climatic change on terrestial ecosystems. The personal invitation was a follow on from an earlier proposal of Angas's to begin a study on the effects of global climate change on the distribution of selected plant species in the species rich kwongan of Western Australia and the rainforests of Northern Queensland. The workshop continues the impetus started by the Green House 87 Conference. Prior to the CSIRO - IGBP workshop Angas will be attending the Australian Academy of Science Conference on the same theme.

* COMPUTING NEWS

recommend management of funds for scientific and technical publishing.


