Following the destruction of the Helena campsite in a bushfire last year, a new and improved campsite was built and is now open.

The new Helena campsite features a fire-resistant shelter, sleeping platforms for up to 24 walkers and 11 tent sites as well as extra undercover seating and benches for you to sit back and enjoy the incredible views.

The campsite operates on a first-come, first-serve basis for Bibbulmun Track walkers only.

100 years of outback history




Step back in time and visit the Millstream Homestead in Millstream Chichester National Park.

Iconic Diamond Tree closed

After decades of serving as a fire lookout and giving fearless climbers the jelly-legs, the Diamond Tree has retired.

A recent routine inspection showed the Diamond Tree is no longer structurally sound and the tree is closed for climbing.

If you're still keen to do a tree climb, the Gloucester Tree and Dave Evans Bicentennial Tree are still open. Both have been assessed and are safe to climb.



Swimming with humpback whales

The three-year trial for swimming with humpback whales has been a success. The Parks and Wildlife Service is now developing a program to guide the future management of swimming with these incredible animals.
