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Intro to Bush Rangers for new instructors

Fishing workshops, bird identification seminars and a drill lesson with Broome's Australian Navy Cadets were all part of the program for participants in the fifth annual Kimberley *Bush Rangers* Conference, held in Broome in February.

The professional development weekend offered Kimberley teachers, education assistants and volunteers involved in Parks and Wildlife's *Bush Rangers WA* cadet program an opportunity to network and share ideas whilst planning the coming year's activities for their cadets.

Parks and Wildlife's Kimberley Bush Rangers Coordinator, Sally Johnston, said over half of this year's conference participants were new to the program.

"We hold this event at the start of the school

year to provide an induction for new staff," said Sally. "It's great to see participants gain the confidence and enthusiasm to start running projects in their local communities."

Visiting the Kimberley for the first time, Parks and Wildlife *Bush Rangers* State Coordinator, Richard Olive, was keen to meet the eight Kimberley schools involved in the program.

"The conference was a huge benefit for me. Every Bush Rangers unit is different and being able to meet unit leaders from places I would never have the opportunity to visit was invaluable," Richard said.

Kimberley Bush Ranger units will meet again later this year for the annual Kimberley Bush Rangers Region Camp, to be held in the East Kimberley in August.

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School holiday fun

During the January school holidays the Yawuru Rangers ran a series of three activities for the Broome Juvenile Justice and drop-in centre kids. This new initiative took kids-at-risk out on country with the Rangers to learn about the importance of caring for country. The Yawuru Rangers trialled a new fire education workshop, 'Funatic Fires', which gives young people an introduction to safe fire management whilst testing out some of the equipment on the fire truck. Other activities included mud crabbing, a litter cleanup and a bushtucker walk.

East Kimberley students flocked to Kununurra Community Library in the last week of the holidays for a series of back-to-school activities offered by Parks and Wildlife. As well as the ever-popular reptile display, younger students had a chance to make

Cane toad update

Who is this hoopoe?

In Term 3 last year we brought you a story about Parks and Wildlife research on Adolphus Island off Wyndham. The cane toad team had installed a series of motion-sensor cameras across the island to try to learn more about the island's goanna and quoll populations. Little did they know, there was a Eurasian hoopoe in their midst. Whilst these migratory birds are common across Europe, Asia and North Africa, this is only the third time a hoopoe has been spotted in Australia. Other animals caught on camera on include quolls, monitors, geckos, a number of native birds, and even a saltwater croc.

Broome Bush Ranger wins bronze at Special Olympics

Broome Senior High School *Bush Ranger* cadet, Sami Savu, recently competed in the National Special Olympics in Melbourne. Sami's extensive training, with coach Erwan (Frenchy) Crozetiere, saw him net a bronze medal for the 50m backstroke.

Just when you thought it might be time for Sami to take a break and rest for a while he was back in the pool for the Virtual Rottnest Swim at Broome Recreation and Aquatic Centre (BRAC).

The virtual Rottnest Swim team included Dave from Headspace, Brendon from KIFSA (Kimberley Individual and Family Support Association), Erwan (Frenchy) from BRAC and Sami, who was swimming for the Special Olympics. The team started the swim at 7am on the same day as the Rottnest swim in Perth.

The Broome team completed the 20 km swim in 5 hours 37 minutes, with the four swimmers completing 5 km each. The next challenge for the team will be the Lake Argyle swim in Kununurra in May, and then the real deal in Perth for next year's Rottnest swim.

The Broome Senior High School Bush Rangers are very proud and honoured to have Sami as a senior cadet and can't wait to cheer him on for his next event.

New turtle reward for Kimberley cadets

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Waste Wise Schools Corner



Worms withstand the wet!



Ever since we reported on Wyndham District High School's fridge worm farm back in Term 2 last year, we have received multiple enquiries all asking the same thing. Will the worms survive the summer holidays? Many schools have been waiting to see what would happen before they take the plunge with their own worm farms. Here's the latest news from Wyndham's Di Kajma,

"Yes, the worms survived the holidays. They are thriving. Because they were kept damp the entire holidays with the automatic sprinkling system they managed to make it through. I also loaded their food up (shredded paper and food scraps) to get them through the break. I fed them again when I got back to town and went to check that they had survived the 5 weeks that I was gone. So all round a great success."

The fridge provides good insulation for the worm farm which is kept in full shade.

How to.... set up a reuse centre for your school



- Set aside a shelf, cupboard, storeroom or shed as your 'reuse centre'. Tell everyone about it.
- Keep leftover lids, bits of string, wire, foam, card, bottle tops and any other exciting-looking materials you come across. Ask students and teachers to bring in clean items in from home.
- Sort items into categories, you might do this by colour, size, material, or any way you choose.
- Use your items for reuse projects, you could make scarecrows, puppets, mobiles or anything else you fancy. For a true reuse project, limit the use of new glue or tape. Time to get creative!

Finding toads and visiting new places to search for toads.

What is most challenging?

Learning not to be distracted by kangaroos or other dogs

What is your favourite part of working in the Kimberley? I get to search for toads every day.

What 3 things would you want if stranded on a desert island? A good bone, my paddling pool full of water and my trainer, Andrew.
