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Aboriginal cultural programs

Nearer to Nature enjoys sharing popular Indigenous experiences at the Wellington Discovery Forest. Last year, we began working with Troy Bennell from Ngalang Wongi Tours.

Local teachers may be familiar with Troy through his work at the Dolphin Discovery Centre and in local schools. Troy has a deep understanding of local Indigenous history and provides a broad insight into Noongar culture including art, dance, song and traditional bush knowledge. Discover your local bushland

To get students nearer to nature, we encourage teachers to take advantage of our incursion programs. Whether you have an area of natural bush on the school grounds, or have a nature reserve nearby, we can offer our expertise to raise awareness of biodiversity and environmental sustainability with students of all ages.



Last August, the Years 4 – 7 students from Maiden’s Park Primary School participated in a 90 minute version of the *Biodiversity’s Base* excursion at a local park reserve. Students learnt about the important jobs done by invertebrates in the ecosystem,

looked for signs of activity in the bushland and searched a range of habitats to discover the amazing diversity of the underworld.

Wellington National Park - Davis block fire

In October, a prescribed burn took place in Davis block adjacent to the Wellington Discovery Forest (WDF). For safety reasons we postponed some excursions that week, and appreciated the understanding from teachers.

In early January, a bushfire started on the north-east boundary of the previously burnt area. It is clear to see how important prescribed burning is when you notice the reduced impact of the fire in the area where the prescribed burn took place.

The proximity of the prescribed burn and bushfire to the Discovery Forest is a great opportunity for students to observe different fire intensities, the consequences and how the forest responds.

Geography curriculum 2015

In response to updated senior school Western Australian curriculum for Geography, some of our excursions have been adapted to reflect new content, and new excursions developed to assist teachers in meeting fieldwork components of the curriculum.

- Living with Fire (Year 5)

Our primary school bushfire program has been running since 2013 and includes developing a classroom resource to assist teachers.

- Environmental change and management (Year 10, Unit 1)

Changing environmental worldviews have changed the way we consider and manage issues of sustainability and environmental change. Students are introduced to the concept of sustainable forest management and its social, economic and environmental considerations

- Sustainable forests (ATAR Units 2 & 3, General Units 1 & 4)

Timber is a versatile and widely used fibre-based commodity. In an increasingly interconnected world, decisions we make about production and distribution of this commodity can no longer be considered in isolation.

- Fire – A natural hazard (ATAR Unit 1, General Unit 3)

Burnt areas adjacent to Wellington Discovery Forest make this an excellent venue to take a good look at the impacts of fire on our forests.



Western Shield school holiday program

During the October school holidays, *Nearer to Nature* teamed up with Australind and Harvey public libraries to present school holiday programs to introduce children and parents to Parks and Wildlife's *Western Shield* wildlife recovery program.


Over a number of sessions, *Nearer to Nature* officer Julie-Anne Oliver kept the kids enthralled with a display of taxidermies, showing some of our native wildlife close up. The children enjoyed hands-on activities and found out what our rangers get up to when they are engaged in wildlife conservation work.



Accommodation options for 2015

Wellington Forest Cottages will be available for school bookings on weekdays. It is recommended to plan your school camp early to make sure you get the dates you prefer.

Wharncliffe Mill continues to offer great rates for school groups and the location offers a range of activities in addition to our *Nearer to Nature* educational excursions, including an extension of the nature play area and a fantastic climbing rope installation. There are times when the facility is booked out exclusively to schools so if you wish to book an excursion here it is advisable to book early.

Book now for *Western Shield* trapping

Every year, we have two opportunities to carry out live marsupial trapping over four consecutive nights at the Wellington Discovery Forest under the *Western Shield* fauna recovery program.

This is a great opportunity for students to be involved in real-life scientific research. Students are introduced to *Western Shield* through a discussion about threats to our native fauna. They bait and set the traps in the late afternoon.

Early the following morning, after a brief discussion about fauna handling techniques and taking measurements, the students check the traps and assist with emptying, measuring and recording as required.

For 2015 our trapping weeks are:
Monday 11 May – Friday 15 May
Monday 14 September – Friday 18 September



We have some flexibility with dates if you book early, so please contact us if you would like to part of this program but the dates do not fit with your timetable.
