State Government changes

You may notice that our department name has changed. On 1 July the Department of Parks and Wildlife merged with the Zoological Parks Authority, the Rottnest Island Authority and the Botanic Gardens and Parks Authority to form the new Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions.

Helping the western ringtail possum

The western ringtail possum is an iconic threatened species. Loss of habitat, primarily due to land clearing for urbanisation since European settlement, and introduced predators, in particular cats, are the main threats. Those fortunate enough to live near the western ringtail possum habitat range are often surprised to find they are an endangered species since they are always ready to make a home in a cosy ceiling space or feast on a range of domestic and native plants.

Over the last two years *Nearer to Nature* has worked with the Cape to Cape

Catchments Group (recently rebadged as



Nature Conservation Margaret River Region) to raise awareness of these iconic animals with a range of primary school incursions in the Margaret River region. Once again this year Tracy Muir will be involved to identify threats, look for signs and understand what they can do to help conserve the western ringtail possum.

Habitat Bunbury grants

The City of Bunbury is offering *Habitat Bunbury* grants to schools in the Greater Bunbury area to participate in environmental projects and education. In early June, Year Three classes from St Joseph's Primary School in Bunbury used part of their grant to travel to Wellington Discovery Forest to participate in *Nearer to Nature's* Incredible Invertebrates program.

Both classes have been studying the lifeform, lifestyle and lifecycle of invertebrates as a part of their science program and were very excited to get out into the forest to see what they would discover. Students were fascinated by what they found in the forest under



logs, and from shaking trees. One group even found a scorpion. The students learnt about biodiversity, which they will draw on in a revegetation project close to their school.
