Business Plan takes shape


An initial draft of the Foundation's Business Plan has been received and discussed by the Steering Committee.



Opening of The Gap lookout

The Gap and Natural Bridge, 18km from the centre of Albany in Torndirrup National Park, has been transformed using a combination of state-of-the-art design and outstanding environmental sensitivity. From vantage points high above the waters of the Southern Ocean, visitors safely experience the awe and excitement of dramatic coastal conditions and spectacular scenery.

The project includes new accessible viewing structures at the Gap and Natural Bridge, paths, a picnic area, visitor information and parking capacity for 27 cars, two ACROD vehicles, three motorcycles and two long vehicles.

Visitors to the Gap will be able to venture safely beyond the precipice to stand on a platform 37m above the ocean. The structure provides universal access to the spectacular views.



The solid pathway and viewing area of the Natural Bridge provides an impressive window to one of Australia's most exposed coasts. Interpretive signage gives an insight into the cultural and geological history of the area and the design of the new viewing facilities.

Extensive measures were undertaken to minimise environmental impact during construction. Existing path alignments and degraded areas were chosen to minimise disturbance, while old paths not being reused were removed and areas rehabilitated. Vehicle and machinery access was limited to a temporary access track to preserve both the natural rock surface and remnant vegetation.

The upgrade of facilities at The Gap and Natural Bridge was officially opened for the start of the April school holidays.

Case study: US National ParkRx initiative

The US National ParkRx Initiative is a movement to strengthen the connection between health care and parks and public lands to improve the physical and mental health among individuals and communities. The initiative is led by the US National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA), the Institute at the Golden Gate (IGG), and the National Park Service (NPS) in the USA.

The National ParkRx Initiative is made up of agencies that are dedicated to using nature and public lands to improve individual and community health. At the heart of the National ParkRx Initiative is the belief that ParkRx programs are going to be key players in preventative health for the future of public health.



ParkRx practitioners are encouraged to communicate with each other on the

National Recreation and Park Association's *Connect Forum*. All ParkRx practitioners, even if they are not NRPA members, are encouraged to join the 'Park Prescriptions' community within NRPA's *Connect Forum* to talk with colleagues and

Park Prescriptions are programs designed in collaboration with healthcare providers and community partners that utilise parks, trails, and open space for the purpose of improving individual and community health.

Feature conservation area: Dryandra Woodland

Dryandra Woodland, 30km north of Narrogin, features the largest area of remnant vegetation in the western wheatbelt and forms part of an international biodiversity hotspot where more than 850 species of plants can be seen. The woodland is home to the numbat, Western Australia's state faunal emblem.

Birdwatching is a favourite activity at Dryandra with spectacular birds such as Carnaby's cockatoo finding the woodlands to be the perfect habitat as well as rare birds such as bush stone curlew and rufous tree creeper. There are also several drive trails. With more than 25 mammal, 100 bird and 50 reptile species there is plenty of wildlife to encounter while exploring the woodlands.
