Perth has many volunteer community groups who are concerned about and involved in urban parks and bushland. Often called "Friends" groups, these champions of parkland provide a valuable service to our community parks. One such group is the Friends of Yellagonga



Regional Park" or FOY who are a group of local enthusiastic conservation volunteers who desire to protect and restore the biodiversity of this Perth northern suburbs regional park, for current and future generations to enjoy.

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### What to do in Parks – Birding/Twitching

#### What to do in Parks - Birding/Twitching

Another way to enjoy our parks is through the activity of "birding" or "twitching" (bird watching). The main goal of twitching is often to accumulate species on one's lists. Some birders engage in competition to accumulate the longest



species list. The act of the pursuit itself is referred to as a twitch or a chase. A rare bird that stays put long enough for people to see it is twitchable or chaseable. Perth has a surprising number of good birding sites within the

metropolitan area or within a two hour drive.

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### Feature park: D'Entrecasteaux National Park

D'Entrecasteaux National Park is a narrow strip of land 5 to 20 km wide which stretches along the south coast along the Indian Ocean for more than 130 kilometres between Augusta and Walpole. It is the result of the amalgamation of various State forests and timber reserves.



Crown land, Shire of Manjimup reserves, conservation reserves, pastoral leases and freehold purchases between the 1970s and 1990s. The park's impressive natural features include (but are not limited to) the hexagonal-shaped basalt columns at Black Point, formed by a volcanic lava flow 135 million years ago, and the 10-kilometre-long Yeagarup Dunes, the largest land-locked mobile dune system in the southern hemisphere, which are moving into the forest at a rate of 4 metres a year.

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### Feature urban park: Yellagonga Regional Park

Yellagonga Regional Park is approximately 13 kilometres contains long and numerous activities to keep both and old young entertained. It contains several lakes wetlands which are part of a larger chain of water bodies which stretch from north of the park south to Cockburn. A local community



group, 'Friends of Yellagonga Park' regularly clean and rehabilitate areas of the site.

Some of the highlights include: The Gap and Natural Bridge

- A new universally accessible viewing platform at the Gap allows visitors to stand 40 metres directly above the surging seas, allowing those brave enough to view the true power of mother nature. The new raised pathways gives safe access to the stunning views and provide protection to vulnerable plants and lichens on the rock surface.
- The pathway out to the Natural Bridge provide a stunning view of the bridge, a monumental span of granite demonstrating the awesome power of the sea when a heavy swell is running. Enjoy epic views of the Southern Ocean and the coast from Bald Head to West Cape Howe.
