Everlasting magic

Western Australia's 2020 wildflower extravaganza is underway. Despite rains arriving late in some areas, carpets of colourful everlastings are now about to appear in the Gascoyne and Murchison regions.

From mid-August as we head into Spring, the amazing natural spectacle of WA's wildflower wealth will extend into the Wheatbelt and Goldfields. By September-October the forests, national parks and reserves of the South West and Southern Outback regions will be in bloom.

WA has more than 12,000 species of wildflowers. Its annual floral display which extends over a sixmonth period, is the largest on earth.

Lead artist appointed for mega mural
