Have your say on proposed marine park

Consultation is now underway for a proposed marine park on WA's south coast.

The marine study area extends from Bremer Bay eastward to the Western Australian border, and offshore to the limit of State waters. Development of an indicative boundary will occur as part of the consultation process.

The Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA), in partnership with the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development, will be consulting the commercial, recreational and charter fishing sectors, along with aquaculture, environmental groups, local

government, traditional owners, tourism groups and the community.

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Giving native wildlife a second chance

Another milestone has been achieved in the innovative Return to 1616 ecological restoration project on Dirk Hartog Island. Eighty vulnerable Shark Bay mice and 58 greater stick-nest rats have been successfully released onto the island.

These are the fifth and sixth mammal translocations to Dirk Hartog Island, completed by the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA) as part of ecological restoration efforts on the island.

Kings Park's Acacia Garden was a delight to behold as we farewelled Winter and welcomed Spring.

Acacias are the largest group of woody plants in Australia, with over 1200 species occurring in habitats ranging from desert to riverine and displaying habits from groundcovers to trees. They comprise the largest native genus in Western Australia, with most favouring arid or semi-arid zones, hence the design choice of a dry watercourse for the hard elements of the Acacia Garden landscape.

Protecting native forests



South West Karri forest

The State Government's recent decision to end logging of native forests means nearly two million hectares of native forests will be protected for future generations.

This includes preserving at least an additional 400,000 hectares of karri, jarrah and wandoo forests. About 9,000 hectares of high conservationvalue karri will receive immediate protection, with other high value forest areas to be recommended for national park status.

Aboriginal communities are being encouraged to register their interest in developing and operating public campgrounds with the expansion of the Camping with Custodians program.

Camping with Custodians is an Australian-first program offered by Tourism WA. In collaboration with the respective communities, top quality campgrounds are built, and are then owned and operated by the community. The campgrounds are open to the public, allowing visitors to learn more about the local Aboriginal culture.

Trails forum and tourism workshops



Former Olympic athlete and passionate outdoor recreation advocate Emma George will give the keynote address on her journey of recovery and resilience at the WA Trails and Recreation Forum to be held in Albany from 13-15 October.

The forum will highlight the major trails projects underway in the Great Southern region. It is a valuable networking opportunity for the wider trails and outdoor recreation community including land managers, government agencies, local government officers, trails and outdoor recreation advocates, the corporate sector, educators and volunteers.

Experiencing biodiversity in the Dryandra

The Dryandra Woodland, near Narrogin, is a rare remnant of the open eucalypt woodlands which covered much of the wheatbelt prior to land clearing which started from the 1890s.

Dryandra's flora is transitional between that of the moister jarrah forest (generally to the south) and the semi-arid wheatbelt (to the east). It is known particularly for its extensive stands of wandoo, powderbark wandoo and salmon white gum and provides a haven for native flora and fauna.

Head for the hills – Wongan Hills, that is!

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
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
