Massive expert and volunteer support for cygnet rescue

The rescue, rehabilitation, and relocation of stranded cygnets at Armadale's Forrestdale Lake has become almost an annual event. As the waters of this seasonal, shallow wetland recede in the summer months, flightless cygnets abandoned by their parents face starvation and stand little chance of surviving predation from foxes and cats.

This year's mercy mission was an enormous challenge, the area's largest yet, with more than 170 cygnets swans rescued ahead of last January's heatwave conditions. It was once again coordinated by the Parks and Wildlife Service with stellar support from wildlife organisations such as WA Seabird Rescue, WA Wildlife, Darling Range Wildlife Shelter WA. Armadale Gosnells Landcare Group and Kanyana Wildlife Rehabilitation Centre.

In all, the rescue involved some 200 volunteers, including Armadale community groups and many others, forming a human chain around the cygnets and shepherding them into pens for relocation.

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Innovative augmented reality experience created for Kings Park

A new, locally developed, augmented reality experience has been introduced at <u>Kings Park</u> to enhance the experience of visitors. Seven augmented reality images developed for the Botanic Gardens and Parks Authority by Perth entrepreneurs Markr Systems have been installed in the Conservation Garden. The stories and images will help educate visitors on conservation and ecosystem restoration. The app has an in-built multilingual translation service.

Using Markr, visitors can learn about the behind-the-scenes work being done at Kings Park and around the State to conserve rare plants and restore them into their natural habitats. Four plant species have been profiled across the Conservation Garden. Virtual signage relating to the plants will also appear on visitor's mobile devices.

Smartreka expanded to include Mount Augustus National Park

Mount Augustus National Park in the Gascoyne region is the latest addition to the WA Parks Foundation's Smartreka mapping series. <u>Smartreka maps</u> make it easier to navigate. They use the built-in GPS on your smartphone or tablet to plot your real-time location. If the maps are downloaded while network access is available this can be done without a network connection and without roaming charges.

The park's main feature, Mount Augustus, is a monocline - a type of folded rock formation that leans, or 'dips' in a single direction. Sitting on a bedrock of

granite, this natural colossus is eight kilometres long and stands 858 metres above the surrounding plain and 1,105 metres above sea level. This largest "rock" in the world, known to local Wadjari Aboriginal people as Burringurah, is twice the size of Uluru and considerably older.

Community input invited for proposed new marine park

A South Coast Marine Park is proposed to ensure the ecological and cultural heritage values of this marvellous region of WA are protected, while allowing commercial, recreational and charter fishing in appropriate zones.

The marine park will be jointly managed by the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA) and the area's Traditional Owners. DBCA also works closely with other State Government agencies, such as the

Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development, which manages fishing in WA marine reserves.

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New boardwalk for beautiful Goegrup Lake

A new and improved boardwalk at Goegrup Lake near Mandurah has been completed and is now open for the public. The new 292-metre-long boardwalk includes three viewing nodes with benches and interpretive panels describing the area's environmental and Aboriginal cultural values.

Goegrup Lake, part of the Peel Yalgorup wetland system, has significant environmental and Aboriginal cultural value. It supports more than 20,000 migratory and resident shorebirds each year and is an important habitat for WA

samphire, a protected native succulent that is a key indicator species for the Coastal Saltmarsh Threatened Ecological Community.
