Spring into Parks and Connect with Nature

National parks and reserves across Western Australia will be showcased in the WA Parks Foundation's Spring into Parks campaign, supported by Lotterywest.

Support for rare parrot shows promising results

Important work to save Western Australia's rarest bird, the Western Ground Parrot from extinction is continuing, with some encouraging results.

It is thought there are fewer than 150 Western Ground Parrots left in the wild.

Researchers and volunteers have completed a wild-to-wild translocation of seven birds this year to a remote site east of Albany to support the establishment of an additional population.

These parrots join seven released in 2021 as part of a threatened species partnership between the Western Australian and Australian Governments, non-government organisations and community volunteers.

The Western Ground Parrot is one of one hundred species prioritised for recovery by the Australian Government. Recovery actions for this flagship species will also benefit other threatened species such as the Western Bristlebird and the Noisy Scrub-bird.

Nature Know-how: Birds along the brook

Ever wondered what bird it is making that particular call in your backyard? What does it look like? Its species? Its Noongar name? And what does its nest look like? More importantly, how you can create habitat for it in your garden?

Join Perth Hills ornithologist Simon Cherriman for a guided nature-walk on Noongar Country at Susannah Brook Lakes in Gidgegannup from 8 am to 10 am on Saturday 3 September. The walk will follow 1.5km of existing bush tracks and will focus on teaching participants how to spot and identify both bush and water-bird species. Also, how to record and submit information using BirdLife Australia's Birdata App.

Citizen scientists invited to track turtles

Citizen scientists have a key role in a new project to save declining populations of the south-western snake-necked turtle. Dwindling numbers of this semiaquatic freshwater species are due to a number of threats, including predators, road strikes and lack of sustainable nesting habitat.

A grant of \$131,700 from Lotterywest will be used to train volunteers as 'turtle trackers' by ecologists from Murdoch University's Harry Butler Institute, and a Turtle SAT app will monitor and record the native species.

The project will be led by The South West Group, an alliance of six local governments in the south west metropolitan region, working with Murdoch University researchers who are collaborating with a national consortium dedicated to conserving freshwater turtles across Australia.

New marine parks in the Buccaneer Archipelago

Following an extensive consultation and planning process, three new marine parks have been established in the Kimberley's breathtakingly beautiful Buccaneer Archipelago. The Bardi Jawi Gaarra, Mayala and Maiyalam marine parks together total more than 600,000 hectares.

In a WA first, the parks have been co-designed and will be jointly managed by Traditional Owners and the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions. The zoning will ensure that areas of conservation and areas of cultural significance to the Dambeemangarddee, Mahala, Bardi Jawi saltwater people are protected.

Fringing reefs have formed around the coast and between the many islands of the Buccaneer Archipelago, withstanding a tidal range in excess of eleven metres. The wide intertidal areas are home to a diversity of plants and animals, all adapted to their coastal environment.

"Woolshed" tourist hub opens at Bullara Station

Pastoral tourism continues to grow in popularity in Western Australia and Bullara Station, situated between Coral Bay and Exmouth on the Ningaloo coast has built a reputation over the past 12 years for providing an authentic station stay experience.

Bullara offers a range of accommodation from two self-contained cottages and the traditional Shearers Lodge, to the Outcamp and authentic and spacious bush camping.

The recent opening of the "Woolshed" Tourist Hub on this family-run, working cattle station has expanded its capacity to accommodate guests and support strong regional tourism growth. The development includes two new high-end glamping tents, sixty new camping and caravan sites, a new ablutions block and hot water system, shearing shed hub, upgraded power systems, and a commercial kitchen and café.

Campsite booking system improved

WA's parks receive about twenty million visits per year, and camping has become hugely popular. An upgraded Park Stay WA online campsite booking system allows for better management of campsites and gives campers more flexibility to cancel or change bookings.

Park Stay WA is used to book campsites managed by the Department of Biodiversity Conservation and Attraction's Parks and Wildlife Service in Western Australia's national parks.

The recent upgrades to this booking system give campers more autonomy when booking by allowing people to create an account, make a booking, and then make changes or cancel the booking if needed. It is hoped the changes will reduce the number of bookings that go unused when campers do not take possession of the site on the booked date, arrive at the site late, or leave early.
