Lightscape set to amaze and delight

The highly anticipated first visit of Lightscape to Western Australia is planned for mid-year. From 16 June to 30 July, this internationally acclaimed immersive experience will use beautiful Kings Park (Kaata Koomba) as its canvas.

The Lightscape masterpiece has captivated millions of people in cities around the world and no two installations are the same.

Visitors journeying along a 1.8 kilometres trail in an after-dark setting will find themselves in a winter wonderland of light, colour and sound. They will experience spectacular features such as the 100,000 tiny, twinkling illuminations of the Winter Cathedral, and the brilliant colours of the Neon Night Gardens with its jumbo-sized floral light sculptures.

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World first climate resilience strategy for Ningaloo

Western Australia's spectacular Ningaloo Coast has become the first UNESCO World Heritage site to finalise a resilience strategy to adapt to climate change.

Taking a holistic view, it proposes actions to support thriving, resilient ecosystems, an educated and empowered community as well as sustainable development of this tourism hotspot.

Coral reefs are critically important ecosystems for the planet. Occupying less than one percent of the ocean floor, they support 25% of all marine life and the livelihoods and wellbeing of almost one billion people.

The Ningaloo Coast Resilience Strategy was developed through a communitydriven process led by the Resilient Reefs initiative, supported by the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions in consultation with the Baiyungu, Thalanyji and Yinikurtura Traditional Owners, scientists and local businesses.

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Rottnest visitor surge

Record visitor numbers show that Rottnest continues to be a favourite destination for local, interstate and the now returning international visitors.

Total visitation statistics rebounded to more than 570,000 in 2022 and visitation records were broken this summer, with 119,554 visiting the island in January, up 24 percent from January 2020.

The draft <u>Rottnest Island Management Plan 2023-28</u>, now open for public comment, sets out the Rottnest Island Authority's priorities for the island's natural and cultural resources, facilities and visitor experience during the next five years.

It includes the draft Rottnest Island Land Use Plan which defines the proposed land uses within the settlement and importantly classifies the remaining 85 percent of the island as a reserve for the purpose of conservation and recreation.

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Dream run for WA tourism businesses in national awards

Western Australia's tourism businesses enjoyed great success at the Qantas Australian Tourism Awards, scooping up a total of 12 awards. This includes five golds, five silvers and two bronze medals. The awards, held in Sydney, celebrate innovation and exceptional standards in Australian tourism.

The gold medals were indicative of the wide range of diverse experiences across the State, with the successful businesses located in Exmouth, Broome, Rottnest Island, Bunker Bay and Perth. The medal winners ranged from cultural walking tours to 5-star hotels, and from whale shark experiences to pearl farming.

"The Australian Tourism Awards reinforce why Western Australia is the place to see in 2023," said WA Tourism Minister Roger Cook.

Kimberley National Parks Tourism Update

The WA Government's assistance package to help impacted communities following the unprecedented floods in the Kimberley includes discounted flights, holiday voucher incentives and a national marketing campaign to send the message that the region is open for tourism.

The package aims to encourage visitors to the Kimberley this year while supporting the local tourism sector as it responds to the recent flooding.

Most of the Kimberley's national parks will be open this tourism season, including Purnululu National Park World, Dulundi (Silent Grove), Walarra Mindi (Mt Hart), and Lennard Gorge. Dimalurru (Tunnel Creek) will also open, but may have a later opening date.

Significant flood damage to visitor infrastructure and post-flood visitor safety risks at Danggu Geikie Gorge National Park and Bandilngan (Windjana Gorge) National Park mean they will remain closed for the rest of 2023.
