# Woylies benefitting from increased fox management

Evidence that populations of the critically endangered woylie (Bettongia penicillata) are making a comeback in Batalling State Forest near Collie

highlights the importance of feral predator management.

Western Shield, the lead wildlife recovery program at the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions, closely monitors populations of native species in targeted bushland areas.

Western Shield zoologist Dr Michelle Drew said that in 2023 a substantial increase in the number of woylies at Batalling was noted, with 34 individuals captured, compared with 19 in 2022, and just two in 2019.

Smartreka digital maps for Wellington National Park west of Collie and Lane Poole Reserve south of Dwellingup in the picturesque Murray River valley are now available via the WA Parks Foundation website.

This brings to 19, the total number of maps published in the Smartreka series, an initiative of the WA Parks Foundation developed with the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions in partnership with BHP.

A further five priority national parks will be selected, including Rottnest Island through a partnership with the Rottnest Island Authority.

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### Spider web DNA opening a new window on wildlife research

Spiders might be silent heroes in helping us understand and keep track of animals, with new Curtin research revealing their webs act like natural traps for tiny bits of environmental DNA (eDNA) from vertebrates.

The groundbreaking study analysed 49 webs from a wildlife sanctuary in Perth's hills and at Perth Zoo and identified the genetic signatures of 93 different animals, from birds and native mammals to meerkats and elephants.

Lead author PhD candidate Joshua Newton, from Curtin's School of Molecular and Life Sciences, said spider webs might be a clever way to keep an eye on what animals are around us.

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#### Fancy being a high-flyer in Pemberton?
