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## ***Nearer to Nature* April school holidays**

Visit Yanchep National Park these school holidays to explore wild caves and discover how animals adapt to their local environment.

During April, the Parks and Wildlife will host a range of fun *Nearer to Nature* activities

for children at the park.

Marketing coordinator Jennifer Green said the popular *Camouflage capers* activity allows participants to gain an insight into how animals camouflage as a survival technique.

“In this activity, kids learn some fascinating facts about camouflage and how they can make their own camouflage cape to take home,” she said.

“*Camouflage capers* will be held on the morning of Thursday 16 April and is suitable for children aged between four and seven.”

“Children see the evidence of tiny animals that have been trapped in limestone at the *Funky fossils* session on the afternoon of 16 April.”

Learn how limestone is made and create your own fossil. This session is aimed at seven to 12-year-olds.



National park guide Inga Price said *Adventure caving*, to be held on Friday 10 April, was another popular school holiday activity that filled up quickly.

“Kids can enjoy the magnificent world of the underground as they crawl and explore their way through one of the park’s wild caves,” she said.

“They will also discover large chambers filled with stunning natural decorations such as stalactites, stalagmites and columns as they make their way through the cave by torchlight.

“We have had a lot of interest in these activities so bookings are essential.”

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## 2015 Great Cocky Count – get involved!

The seventh annual Great Cocky Count will be held on Sunday 12 April, and is

Western Australia's biggest survey of endangered Carnaby's cockatoos. Populations have decreased by 50 per cent over the past 50 years.

On Sunday 12 April, hundreds of volunteers across the south-west will count Carnaby's at night-time roost sites, and this year will also include the threatened red-tailed black cockatoo.

Help identify more roost sites for both white-tailed and red-tailed black-cockatoos!

Yanchep National Park volunteers and staff took part in a bushland clean-up earlier this month as part of the 25th annual Clean Up Australia Day. Rubbish that had been dumped along internal bush tracks within the park was targeted, and despite it being a very hot day, participants collected about 45 bags of small items and four truckloads of larger items including old fencing, beds, televisions and building materials.

As a thank you for their efforts, the Yanchep National Park Volunteer Association provided a sausage sizzle and welcoming cool drink following the successful morning event.

About 526,270 volunteers across the country stepped up to contribute towards Clean Up Australia Week (24 February to 1 March), collecting 13,563 tonnes of rubbish at 6165 clean-up sites across Australia.
