

## New year, new venture

The new year will see a new venture in Yanchep National Park, with EasyRider Adventure Tours starting operations. Visitors to the national park will be able to ride an electric personal transporter, or self-balancing scooter.

This unique experience is not your average tour where a guide leads a group on a set

path - you will be free to test your mettle and skills in a safe zone.

Even better ... no family member will be left on the bench because EasyRider caters for people using wheelchairs.

## **Dugite mapping and trapping**

Yanchep National Park volunteers have recently had a unique opportunity to assist Curtin University Environmental Biology PhD candidate Ashleigh Wolfe with her research. Ashleigh is passionate about reptiles and her work here at Yanchep is focused on dugites (*Pseudonaja affinis*) and bobtail lizards (*Tiliqua rugosa*), which are very active at this time of year.



Ashleigh tracks the movements of these reptiles through an external GPS unit attached to their tails. The movements can then be mapped and analysed, providing new information to improve our understanding about these awesome creatures.

Volunteers helped to track translocated dugites and set up funnel traps to monitor local fauna and find a resident dugite for the project. The traps were checked daily, animals identified and then released back into the bush. Ashleigh has been teaching volunteers about tracking equipment, safe and ethical trapping techniques and reptile identification.

Our volunteers are thankful for this fantastic opportunity to learn specialised field techniques, increase knowledge about native species and be a part of a meaningful research project.

Giant chocolate freckles are also available and can be personalised with a handdecorated Christmas message by pre-order, a truly unique chocolate gift!




## **Summer lovers in Yanchep National Park**


Summer is a great time to visit Yanchep National Park. The beautiful Morrison featherflower can be spotted along the coastal plain sheltered under the flowering banksia and tuart trees, Carnaby's cockatoos fly in flocks overhead and Christmas

beetles (Australian scarab beetles)

(Anoplognathu) remind us that it's the festive season. While enjoying some time out in the park this summer keep your eyes peeled for these two summer loving residents of Yanchep National Park:

Christmas tree (*Nuytsia floribunda*). This beautiful hermiparasitic tree grows to a height of 8m and occurs on sandy soils of the Swan Coastal Plain. Its bright orange flowers can be seen throughout the summer season and it is often referred to as the native Christmas tree. Traditionally, as the Nyoongar season of Kambarang turned to Birak, the bark of the Christmas tree was used for making shields.





common throughout this region and often seeks shelter beneath a variety of ground covers including rubbish and corrugated iron. During summer they are a familiar sight on our roads and unfortunately this slow-moving lizard often falls victim to traffic. These harmless little lizards mate for life so please take care when you see them crossing this summer, they may have a partner waiting on the other side!
