

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Park staff prepare campground

Yanchep National Park staff have been kept busy over the past few months as plans to expand Parks and Wildlife's camping network unfold. Following Environment Minister Albert Jacobs's announcement that, as part of the *Parks for People* initiative, a camping trial will commence in Yanchep National Park, the park's



operational team have been working hard on the ground.

Located on the Henry White Oval, the new campground will have 20 sites to accommodate caravans, campervans, camper trailers and tents during the trial period.

Park manager Julia Coggins said the team had been busy completing woodland revegetation works, erecting new boundary signage with directional symbols and road markings to improve traffic flow.

"A one-way boom gate has been installed and camp sites have been measured, marked and designated," she said.

"The ablution block has also been upgraded with hot water showers added. Visitor

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park maps. The camping trial is an exciting addition to the park and will provide an excellent opportunity for people to stay and experience Yanchep's many attractions," Julia said.

NAIDOC Week celebrations and school holiday fun

To kick off <u>NAIDOC Week 2016</u> Yanchep National Park has teamed up with City of Wanneroo to offer an **Aboriginal Cultural Tour of the Yaberoo Budjara Trail on Sunday 3 July**.

Participants will walk a section of the trail with Yanchep's Indigenous guide Derek Nannup, and learn about the richly diverse history and culture of local Aboriginal people. Derek will also give an insight into the unique local plants and their use in bush food and traditional medicines.

The tour will start and finish in Yanchep National Park with participants travelling by bus to the start point at Lacey Road and walking back in. A bush tucker style lunch is also included. Registrations are essential and places are limited. Bookings are available at www.ybculturetour.eventbrite.com.au and enquiries can be made to the City of Wanneroo on 9405 5900.

To continue the celebrations Yanchep National Park will hold a **special NAIDOC Day event on Saturday 9 July**. Visitors are invited to come along and join park staff in celebrating the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. Following an acknowledgement of country in the Wangi Mia at 11am a free program of activities will commence including sand art in the Yorga Mia with Judith Birchall, a traditional artefact display and fun children's activities such as message stick art and traditional face painting.

At 12.30pm Yanchep National Park volunteers will cook up a barbecue with damper and bush tucker tastings and at 1pm its time to pull up a stump and settle in for 'Kaartdijin Dreaming'. During this session Derek will tell the story of the painted canvas mural that provides the backdrop to our cultural interpretative area in the Wangi Mia.

At 2pm the regular Aboriginal Experience session will be free (usually \$14 an adult ticket) and visitors are encouraged to join in and learn more about the history and way of life of Aboriginal people in our area.

The fun will continue through the school holidays with a program of culturally themed

Songline sheets will be available for children to collect and complete with their days 'songline' or journey through Yanchep National Park.

The school holiday activities are free of charge however bookings are required and all children must be accompanied by a parent or guardian. For more information or to book please call 9303 7772.

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describe you?


Talkative, funny, team player (that's four hehe).

They were given tools, saws and sandpaper. The boys immediately began building a cubby, the girls started 'cooking' with mud and used the tools to whittle — they made pencils, fairy houses and wands. I left some rope on the ground, the boys took it and started making bows and arrows, they tied a rock around a stick and made axes, they were responsible and cooperative and there was not one mishap. Leaders and followers naturally emerged, they worked together as a team, found places to hide and explore, their play was guided and inspired by nature.




Winter wonders on the Woodland Trail



Red ink sundew — Yanchep National Park visitor services officer Madonna Mulholland snapped this stunning photo of a red ink sundew or *Drosera erythrorhiza* on a walk through the park recently. This dainty little sundew is a perennial tuberous species of carnivorous plant and can be found throughout the Perth region. With a height of between just 50–300mm they can be difficult to spot but a keen eye may be drawn to the glistening moisture from winter rains sitting in droplets on the
