SEE AND HEAR THE NOISY SCRUB-BIRD

NOISY BIRD CALLS

This is the noisy scrub-bird single or double song. It is probably best song to detect its territory. The human ear can hear it from as far away as 2 km.

This loud song makes the male scrub-bird easy to locate, but he is nearly impossible to see in the dark targeted scrub.

Territories range in size from 2 to 10 hectares. Songs and other calls are important for communication in the dense bush that blocks visual contact.

Male scrub-birds who are younger or of lesser status may live in another male's territory but they do not sing a territorial song.

A dominant male sometimes sings a more "whee" "short song" that seems to be less threatening. He also has a number of loud "chirp" and "whistle" notes.

★ THE SHORT SONG may also be a key of identity.

"I know this is your territory. Please just let me pass."

"I am a strong male, worthy of respect. Keep on the edge of your territory."

"Yes, mate, it's not just what I've been looking for!"

TRANSITION OF POWER

In 1982, the first conservation agreement was signed between the government of the Philippines and the World Bank for the first time.
