

While some visitors go to Brides Cave in the Leeuwin Naturaliste National Park to defy gravity by abseiling into the doline others are happier admiring this natural marvel from the safety of a new viewing platform recently constructed with financial and other assistance from cavers. The simple wooden structure belies the solid foundations and careful carpentry necessary when building next to a long drop. (Negative number 19)





















Many of the trees close to the doline of Brides Cave have suffered from rope burns. Designated abseiling points have now been selected and structures like this anchor point has been built. 1. The new lookout at Redgate Beach in the Leeuwin Naturaliste National Park. The brass plaque commemorating the 1976 reenactment of the rescue of the passengers from the steamship "Georgette" was replaced on the new concrete plinth while additional information about the Georgette has been fixed to the low walls of the lookout. The lookout is designed to draw visitors in a narrow walkway and then focus their attention outwards on the wreck site and the spectacular but treacherous coastline. (Negative number 3)

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
